FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERVISOR

Dear Community Resident,

This past year 2016 flew by at a very rapid rate. The old adage about time is long days and short years certainly applies to my first year tenure as East Bloomfield Town Supervisor. The technical parts of the position are more complex than one would observe. In order to provide timely and responsible municipal service to our citizens, we collaborate and problem solve as a team. The team involves the town board, town board committees and the town departments. My belief is a high performing interdependent team all moving in the same direction directly benefits everyone in East Bloomfield. As we begin our second year together as municipal employees, it is my goal to increase our communication and collaboration with each other in order to provide effective town government services. One example of our collaboration is town and village partnership. Village Mayor Mark Falzone and I, along with the personnel committee have worked together to recruit a new Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) for the town and village. Since the town shares the CEO with the village it only seems reasonable that we collaborate to recruit a highly qualified candidate.

Some recent news:

- We installed new windows with security at the Veterans Park Legion building.
- The Town was awarded \$15,000 from the NYS JCAP Grant to provide facility and security upgrades to the East Bloomfield Town Court. Security and safety in our town courts is paramount and we will continue to make improvements.
- America's past time continues to be baseball even for our youngest players. We have been meeting with the baseball and softball leaders to establish a schedule for all teams. We have also met with Bloomfield Central School (BCS) to determine if any BCS fields would be available. The community demand has outweighed the supply and so we are in the process of rebuilding that sports schedule.
- Community based soccer programs are also requesting fields at Veterans Park (VP) and we will be following the same process to accommodate soccer between VP and BCS.

These four examples of collaboration and teamwork prove to me that when we all work toward the same goal and adapt a philosophy of give and take great things can happen. The spirit of compromise, fairness and problem solving remain priorities for me as we continue to build a great community in the scenic beauty of East Bloomfield.

Our club welcomes new members and our meetings are open to the public. Our meetings take place at Veterans Park on the third Thursday of each month at 11:45 AM.

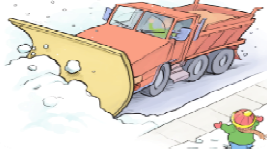

HELLO FROM THE HIGHWAY DEPT!



Hope everyone had happy holidays. As everyone knows we are well into winter operations. So far this winter everything has been going well, although one of our plow trucks broke down and we thought it was the end for that truck. After multiple repair quotes, it turned out better than we thought with many thanks to Tom's Mechanical in Ionia. Assisting Tom was our own Mike Lovejoy from the highway department.

When projecting winter operations expenses, we often use year over year comparison, and this is where we are so far this winter:

December 2015 we plowed 452 miles and used 130 tons of salt, and in December 2016, we plowed 5,414 miles and used 805 tons of salt. Of course 2015 was a very mild winter, you can see the highway crew was quite busy the end of last year.

In addition to our own town roads, the highway department is also responsible for salting the Bloomfield Schools and Village of Bloomfield streets after those teams plow, saving on salting equipment costs for the two groups. The Town Highway is also responsible for Town owned parking lots like the Town Hall and Veterans Park.

Since the famous Punxsutawney Phil saw his shadow, we should expect 6 more weeks of winter, but as most of us know it will be over when Mother Nature says its over. I always have a lot of people ask me what I think the winter will do, and I always respond by saying "I'll let you know in the Spring."

With the changes in temperatures, we have a few pot holes bubbling up. If you see one, please don't hesitate and call us at the highway department.

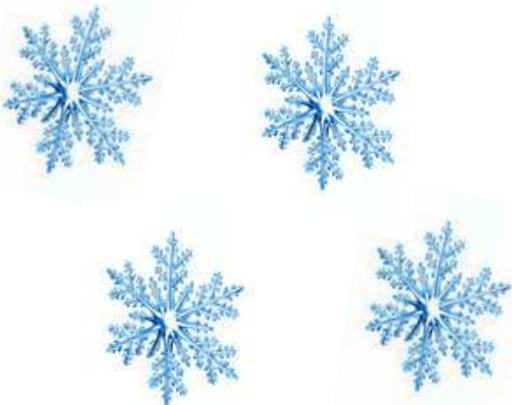
This winter we have deployed a new personnel staffing schedule, allowing for Monday through Friday snow coverage, as well as early morning road analysis if the plow team needs to come in early for snow removal or salting. The team has shared the responsibilities to ensure our community has safe highways for the work week.

Spring will be here before we know it, until then, please remember to drive cautiously in the snow and please slow down around our plow trucks and road personnel.

I LOVE SNOW

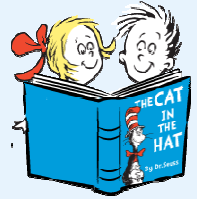
I love snow, I love snow,

The museum is in the middle of a relocation of some kiosks in both Phase I and II. The teletype display, long situated in cramped quarters because of its large machines, has moved from the smallest kiosk in Phase I to a kiosk in Phase II, double the size of its former location. The television display will relocate to this empty space.

The Armstrong exhibit, currently housed in a corner of the inventors' display will be relocated to the emptied television display with the addition of his contemporaries Edison and De Forest. These changes will enhance a series of kiosks and provide a cleaner positioning of the 1840-1920 timeline.

Volunteer Michael Happell continues to revitalize the Voice of America station as its simulation of on the air status increases.

A tour group, which cancelled their visit earlier because of severe winter weather, returned in mid-February to complete their second visit in two years and view for the first time the completed Phase II.

During March the entire 4th grade from Honeoye Falls—Lima School District will, for the first time, tour the museum in conjunction with studies in their classes at school.

Selection continues of artifacts for sale and auction during the Spring Meet on May 6th at Veterans Park.

The museum hosted a group of tour agents from the area recently to showcase the museum as a site to visit. One agent has already responded with an upcoming tour group which will visit later this year.

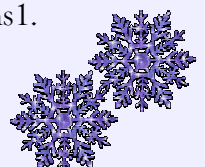
